
Australia Day Awards

Like many organizations in our community, it was driven by a small but dedicated group of volunteers committed to raising funds for the school while promoting it to the wider community. Local businesses and families donated prizes, and over 100 people from near and far dressed as their favourite Aussie icons—fully embracing the chance to have fun and give back.

The event was the first major gathering after the initial refurbishments at the Town Hall. It was a night filled with laughter, friendship, and a shared goal to support Brookton District High School students. That evening, this group of volunteers raised an incredible \$3,500.

Each year, we also honour an individual who has made an extraordinary difference in our community. Sometimes they're larger-than-life personalities; other times, they're quiet achievers whose contributions only become clear when someone takes the time to document them. That was exactly my reaction when I received the nomination for this year's Citizen of the Year, Kathy Bassett. When I called Kathy to congratulate her, I said, "Wow, Kathy, what a contribution you have made." Now let me share with you why her impact is truly remarkable.

Kathy moved to Brookton in 1978 and established a successful hair salon, which she ran for 10 years. Like many great Brookton stories, she met a handsome young farmer at tennis. They married in 1980 and raised three beautiful children together.


Over the past 47 years, Kathy has been deeply involved in our community. She joined the Brookton Performing Arts (formerly the Choral Society) in 1984, became a committee member in 1985, and served as treasurer from 1986 to 1990. Her roles have included acting, singing, playing instruments, and serving as the musical director since 2004. Kathy's tireless work on choral harmonies, piano accompaniments, and much more has inspired everyone around her.

Kathy is also a strong supporter of Friends of Kalkarni, currently serving as Secretary. Her dedication to caring for residents and making them feel special is a true testament to her kindness. In addition, Kathy has been the organist at St Mark's Anglican Church since 2004 and arranges singers for Christmas Carol services. She's always ready to step in and help, and she currently serves as Secretary of the St Mark's Anglican Guild.

Kathy and her husband Graeme have been passionate members of the Brookton Tennis Club for many years. Kathy coordinated Junior Tennis whilst her children were young and served as Ladies Captain from 1994 to 1996. She's also been involved with the Brookton Girl Guides, the Brookton District High School Pre-Primary Committee, and the Brookton Women's Hockey Club, where she was a premiership player and a committed team member.


